

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### Personal Profile: Dr Rodney Vincent Auer

Rod graduated in 1968 and almost immediately commenced work at the Brisbane Children's Dental Hospital. From the mid 1970's, Rod took over the dental and orthodontic management of children with cleft lip and palate disorders and related craniofacial anomalies - a role he still fills to this day. Currently, Rod is Senior Dentist (Cleft Lip and Palate) at Children's Oral Health Service at the Royal Children's Hospital and he consistently promotes the merits of multidisciplinary management of children with clefts in Queensland.

In 2001, Rod completed his Masters Degree in Orthodontics at the University of Queensland researching patterns of intra-oral clefting in infants.

Rod was awarded an Australia Day Medallion in the Australia Day Honours in 2003 while in 2007 he was awarded the Australian Dental Association (Qld Branch) Distinguished Service Award in recognition of outstanding Public Service spanning nearly four decades in treatment and management of patients with cleft lip and palate disorders and related craniofacial anomalies. Rod has signaled his intention to retire mid-2009 and will be sorely missed.

### A Brief History of Cleft Lip and Palate Management in Queensland

The coordinated management of patients with cleft lip and palate anomalies in Queensland can be traced back to the early 1960's when a Brisbane Public Dentist, Dr Noel Cause developed a special interest in the dental care of children with cleft lip and palate disorders. Dr Cause went on to become the first dental superintendent of the Brisbane Children's Dental Hospital and in 1964 promoted informal medical/dental cooperation in the management of infants and children. The two main plastic/paediatric surgeons involved in this cooperative management were Dr Llew Swiss Davies and Dr Des McGuckin.

In the early 1970's Dr Bob Greenhill (dentist) took over from Dr Cause until 1975 when Dr Rod Auer (dentist) and Dr Laurie Baiano (dentist) became involved. Although unofficial Cleft Palate Team meetings did occur, they were at irregular times and locations. It would be nearly another 5 years (1980) before the then Medical Superintendent at the Royal Children's Hospital in Brisbane convened a meeting of involved medical and dental personnel which ultimately led to the establishment of the official Cleft Palate Clinic at the Royal Children's Hospital on Brisbane's northside. Around the same time, official Cleft Palate and Craniofacial Clinics were established at the Mater Children's Hospital on Brisbane's south-side.

Over the years, many talented surgeons were closely involved in the Clinics at both hospitals. Plastic surgeons Dr Tony Emmett, Dr Peter Catt, Dr Michael Lanigan, Dr John Carney, Paediatric Surgeon Dr Des McGuckin and neurosurgeon Dr Leigh Atkinson were particularly prominent.

Speech pathology services within the Teams developed enormously during the 1980's under the influence of an American speech pathologist, Denis Newman. Denis ensured the training of Speech pathologists at the University of Queensland emphasised the management of children and adolescents with cleft disorders. This has contributed to the high quality of the current personnel at the Speech Pathology Departments at both the Royal Children's and Mater Children's Hospitals.

Orthodontic and paedodontic services for children with cleft palate disorders received a major boost in 1994 when Children's Oral Health Service opened on site at the Royal Children's Hospital. Dr David McMaugh (Dental Superintendent) was the driving force behind establishing this tertiary care, purpose-built facility. The Brisbane Children's Dental Hospital closed soon after and all chair-side dental specialist services since have been delivered by staff at Children's Oral Health Service.

The current members of the Royal Children's Hospital and Mater Children's Hospital Cleft Lip and Palate Teams in Brisbane are listed over the page.

In 2006, the Queensland Government committed to build a new Queensland Children's Hospital in Brisbane with the aim of combining all paediatric tertiary services into one hospital by 2012. It is envisaged that the two Teams will also combine at this time.

### A Brief History of Cleft Lip and Palate Management in Queensland Continued



Queensland is a large, decentralized state, with a population just over four million people. It is the only state in Australia that has more people living outside the capital city boundaries than inside. Another smaller Cleft Lip and Palate Clinic at the Townsville Base Hospital. Dr Harry Stalewski is the plastic surgeon while local orthodontists Geoff Stanton, Paul Hanrahan and Linda Ton provide support. There has been a rapid increase in the population of North Queensland and so the Townsville Clinic is likely to grow over time.

The latest statistics from Queensland Health show there are around 55,000 live births in Queensland per year and of these, some 80 infants are born with cleft conditions. The majority of these infants undergo surgery in Brisbane and are managed by the Royal Children's and Mater Children's Cleft Lip and Palate Teams. The Royal Children's Hospital Team meets three times a month while the Mater Children's Hospital Cleft Lip and Palate/Craniofacial Team meets at least once a month.

Parents of children with clefts from northern New South Wales also commonly choose to attend the Brisbane Teams for surgery and management, as Brisbane is closer than Newcastle or Sydney.

Orthodontic treatment for children/adults living more than a few hours drive from Brisbane is often provided by interested orthodontists in the major provincial cities. Similarly, speech therapy is often provided by local speech pathologists (if available) for children/adults living in places remote from Brisbane. The speech pathologists and orthodontists of the Teams of the two Brisbane Children's Hospitals provide support and guidance for these patients and their local treating clinician.
